Over the last 10 years as I've been a part of Nauset Heights, I've watched our delicate Spit change, both physically and politically, and with it, the Nauset Inlet and Marsh it protects. And while long-time residents have assured me the sands of the Spit do ebb and flow over the decades, I want to make sure we can protect these natural resources as part of our environment, and part of the Nauset Heights culture.

To that end, I'm keeping in contact with the Town on a possible dredging project; an effort to restore the depth of the waters that inevitably fill in with sand. While the project would help local fishermen and boaters, it also would help preserve waters that hug much of Nauset Heights, ensuring a daily cleansing from the ocean, and allowing wildlife to flourish. The Town is in favor of the project's concepts, but the wheels of government are slow to turn, and much of the project's work is in Eastham's waters, adding extra layers to the approval of work. Environmental Committee Update

The Nauset Heights Association's Officers, Board, and Members have always had a special connection with the natural wonders of this area. Over the past ten years, your NHA Environmental Committee has helped the Association bring additional focus to the "shared" love of our surroundings from working with the Harbor Master, Conservation Commission, and other Town Departments.

We are here to provide you with resources, education, and mentors on a wide range of areas. Some topics include:

- · invasive species that might pop up in one's backyard,
- how to have the lawn we treasure, but balance with fertilizers best suited for our area to avoid impacting our waters, fishing, and clamming,
- with increasing severe storms, erosion control methods that blend in with our neighborhood, household storm water pollution prevention, etc.

In addition, we welcome all of our members for the Fall Spruce Up and Spring Fling community clean ups where we tidy up our neighborhood and have the chance to meet and talk before setting out. We see clean up efforts more than a couple of events – but an ongoing effort by the spirit of all of us when we walk around Nauset Heights throughout the year.

Tips from the Committee

- If you have brush or other plants encasing or growing up your utility poles, trim them away to avoid electrical issues. You can contact National Grid for assistance. Bill Dunham has made this contact in the past, and he will walk you through the process.
- Keep the drains in front of your property clear and flowing. Allowing grass or dirt to cover the drains hinders proper storm water drainage.

Our additional educational programs often come from you reaching out to us, so please continue. We have had the National Park Supervisor for Cape Cod Speak at our July Meeting, walking tours of horseshoe crabs in the inlet lead by Janet Bush, and most recently an organic garden tour hosted by Ann Rickard and Richard Thompson.

Our outreach to Environmental Officials in Orleans and beyond allows our educational opportunities to grow. In particular, the work of the Orleans Pond Coalition with their range of programs and educational resources becoming a model for all.
